*[and] for training in righteousness (in holy living, in conformity to God's will in thought, purpose, and action), 17 So that the man of God may be **complete and proficient**, well fitted and **thoroughly equipped for every good work.***

Actually the Lord has a far better teacher and instructs us to not depend at all on the flesh and its insights. Can experience be a teacher? Certainly. It can be a hard teacher. For instance, when Melissa and Jessica were little, if one had been seriously burned against the stove, that would have indeed taught a profound lesson—but thankfully both learned quite effectively of the hot stove dangers by simply listening to our instruction. A painful lesson, though memorable, is in no way required nor is it the best teacher. Some learn from life's experience to no longer trust anyone. Experience can indeed be a deceiving teacher and the devil doubtlessly wants to influence your experiences to modify your confidence in God and His Word—**modify your**

God designed His living Word to be our instructor—the lamp for our feet, the light for our path. He intends for you and me to place full trust in what that Word says with no requirement of experiential confirmation. In truth, **finding conflict between God's Word and our natural mind and its influences is to be expected.** If His Word cannot accomplish the task of spiritually instructing, it cannot be done. God's Word in no way needs the support of our personal experience to somehow 'close the deal' or offer final confirmation. That experience can deceive as easily as it can confirm. In both Mk 13 and Mt. 24, Jesus declares that in the last days, even God's elect may be subject to experiential deception.

Experience can indeed be a profound teacher, but not the best. Regardless of how compelling its lesson, it can never overrule or replace the Word as the Light for our path—the **final word!**
